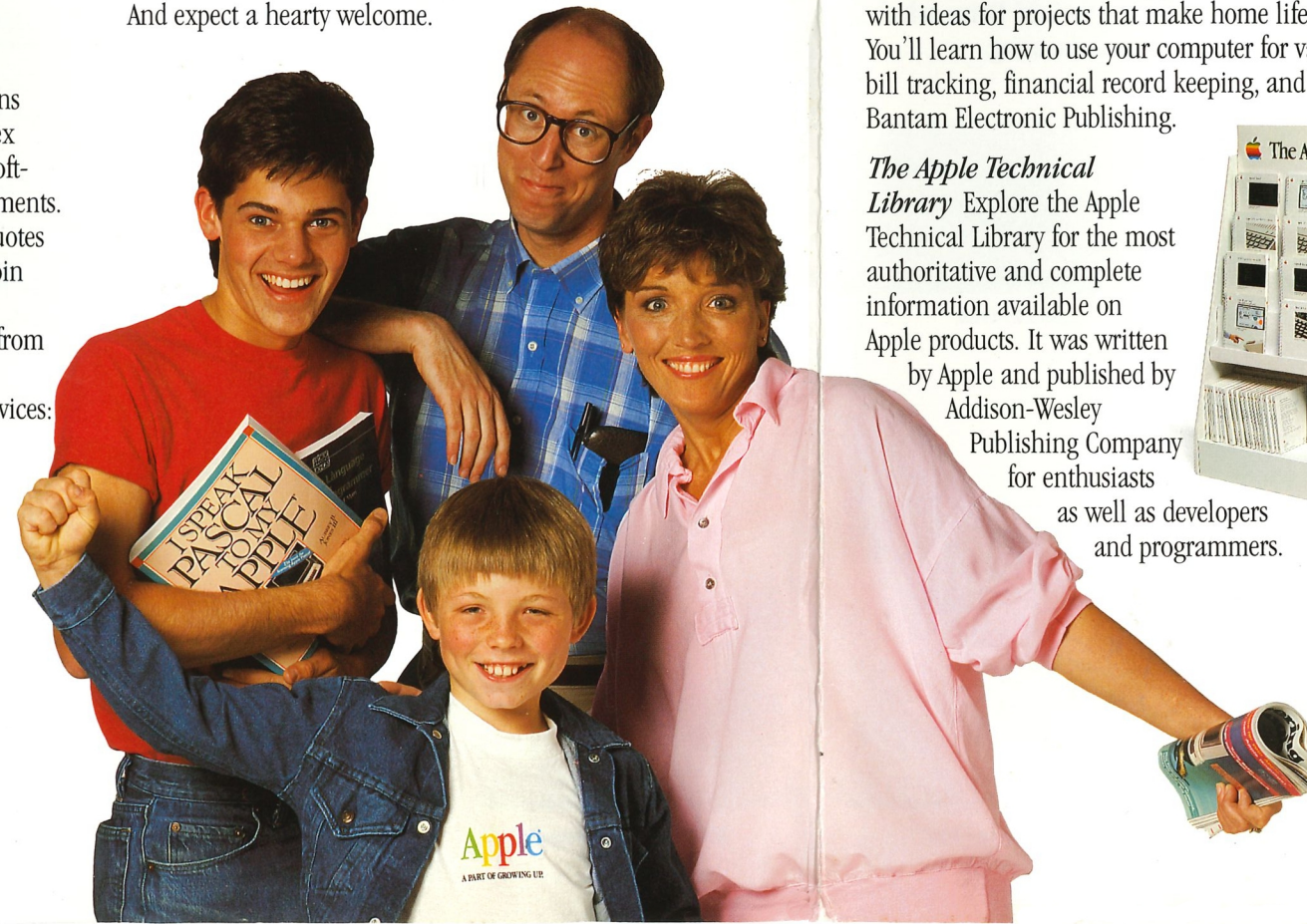

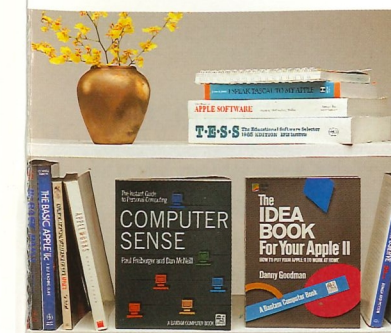

There's a library of books waiting for you.

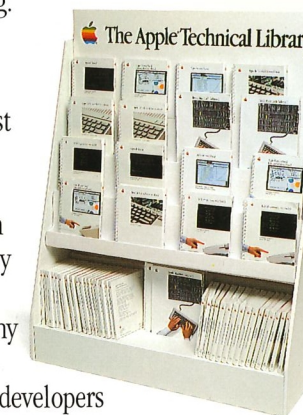

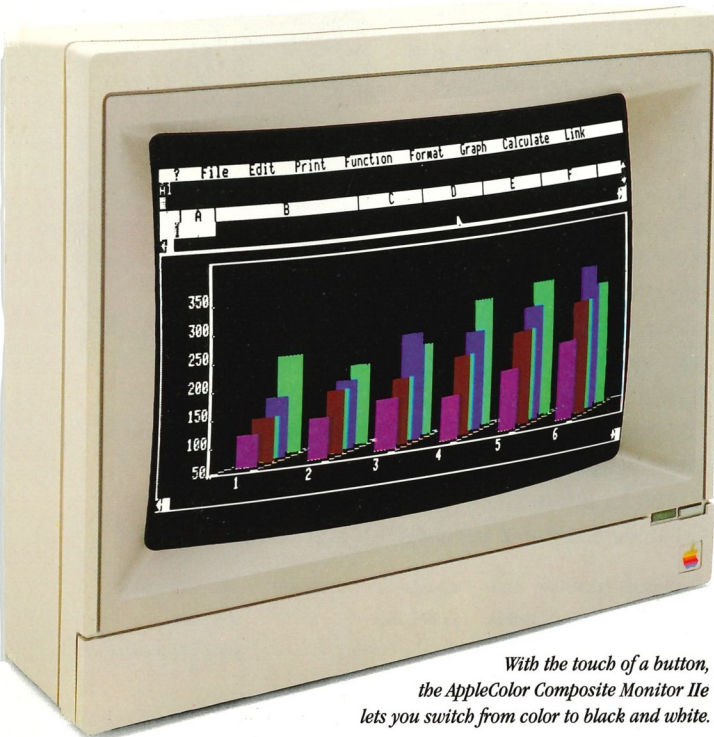

Get the picture.

Consider the 13-inch **AppleColor Composite Monitor IIe**. It lets you switch between color and black and white with the touch of a button.

Or get the picture with the affordable **Apple Monochrome Monitor IIe**. It has a 12-inch screen that produces exceptionally crisp graphics and text.

Plug into more storage space.

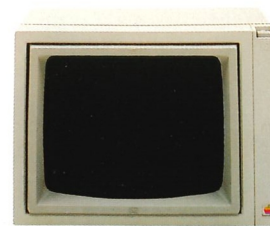

Apple 5.25 Drive



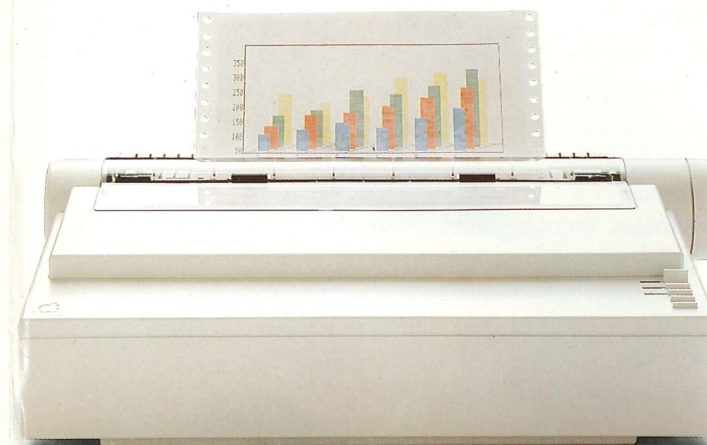

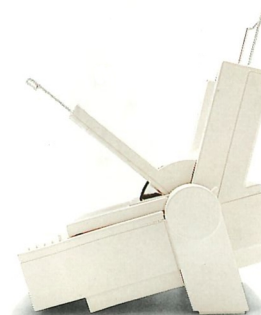

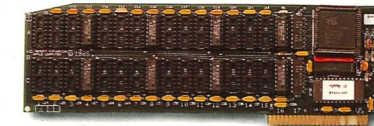

Add accessories with muscle.

Plug the **Apple SCSI Interface Card** into your Apple system and see how fast you'll go. The SCSI (Small Computer System Interface) provides a remarkably fast way to move information from your computer to a daisy chain of peripherals. And vice versa.



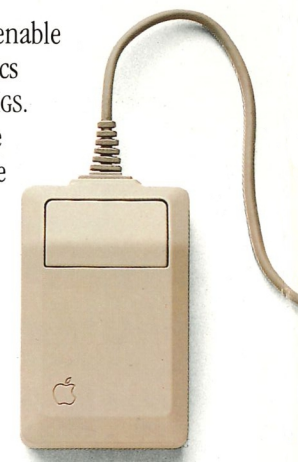
Apple II Memory Expansion Card
